

Highlights

- The intensity of suicidal ideation at the worst point differentiated individuals who have only thought about suicide from those who have attempted.
- There is a greater likelihood of a history of suicide attempts when individuals have endorsed high intensity at the worst point of their suicidal ideation.
- Painful and provocative events partially accounted for the aforementioned relationship while a heightened capability for suicide.
