### Highlights

- 29.8% of participants had been victimized in cyberbullying
- Cyberbullying victims but not bully-victims with anger ruminative tendencies and strong unjust world beliefs are more likely to experience psychiatric symptoms
- There are substantial differences between victims and bully-victims in the mechanisms underlying the victimization—psychiatric symptoms association
- Emotion regulation and just world beliefs appeared to be protective factors against psychiatric symptoms in cyberbullying victims but not bully-victims
