1. Introduction

BPD is a significant clinical syndrome characterized by heightened emotion dysregulation, impulsivity, rocky and unstable interpersonal relationships, and chronic feelings of emptiness. Suicidal behavior and suicide ideation are common experiences for those with BPD and are included as symptoms of the disorder in the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders-5 (DSM-5; APA, 2013). Psychological autopsy studies have suggested that up to 33% of participants who died by suicide might have been diagnosed with BPD if they had been assessed (Kullgren et al., 1986; Runeson and Beskow, 1991). The risk for attempting suicide is significantly increased in psychiatric inpatients diagnosed with an affective disorder (e.g., major depressive disorder, schizoaffective disorder, and bipolar disorder) when BPD is Download English Version:
