Highlights

- Facebook victimization is a widespread phenomenon among university students.
- Personality variables and risky FB lifestyle were linked to FB victimization.
- Indiscreet FB content, time spent and friends on FB increased FB victimization risk.
- Depression, self-disclosure and indiscreet FB content predicted FB victimization.
