Highlights

- Previous research has found mixed effects of parental mediation on youths' behavior.
- We investigated whether the communicative style of parental mediation matters.
- Autonomy-supportive restriction was related to lower media violence and aggression.
- Inconsistent restriction was related to higher media violence exposure and aggression.
- Theoretical and methodological next steps for parental mediation research are identified.

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
