**Highlights**

We revisit the question of what is the rate of return to education in Great Britain.  
We assess the sensitivity of some key existing studies to equation specification.  
Our results highlight the importance of equation specification and estimation method.  
Our results provide a robust case for a 6% rate of return to education for men.
