- 9 Separation anxiety has long been recognized as an anxiety-related disorder in dogs that is
- only observed in the owner's real absence or perceived absence. Over the past four decades,
- this condition has been the most commonly discussed in published studies, but etiology,
- treatment, and prevention remain elusive. A review of the literature indicates a lack of
- comparative studies. Little progress has been made to build a new understanding beyond
- 14 the clinical symptomology. Future research employing more rigorous designs and
- systematically building upon a clearly defined research questions is needed to advance our
- 16 knowledge of this most common behavioral problems in dogs.
