Highlights

Over 50% of minimally treated first episode psychosis patients have a lifetime substance use disorder (SUD)

Despite positive effects of coordinated specialty care (CSC) on retention in treatment, symptoms and social functioning, CSC did not impact substance use

Exposure to specialized substance use treatment was low, suggesting necessary future modifications to clinician training and implementation
