Highlights

- Subjective incompetence amelioration is observed by mid-treatment in CBT-based ED treatment
- Such early improvements in subjective incompetence predict reduced ED symptomatology
- Improved subjective incompetence also predicts gains in psychological well-being
- Psychotherapeutic strategies in EDs should target subjective incompetence
