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Coping Styles in Individuals at Ultra-High Risk for Psychosis: Associations with Cognitive Appraisals

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Highlights

- Individuals at ultra-high risk (UHR) for psychosis are less likely to rely on active coping and more likely to rely on passive coping.
- Aberrant attribution style of the hostility perception and composite blaming bias in UHR for psychosis are associated with problem-focused coping and tension-reduction, respectively.
- Perceived social support in UHR for psychosis is associated with problem-focused coping, seeking social support, and wishful thinking.
- General self-efficacy in UHR for psychosis is primarily related to problem-focused coping.

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
