- We estimate the earnings gains to attending a for-profit college, relative to no college.
- For-profit associate’s degree students experience a small positive increase in earnings after attendance.
- Our estimates are lower than those found in studies of other sectors.
- Comparing costs to benefits, for-profit colleges may not be worthwhile for the average student.
