

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#### **Background**

Future nurses need to be broadly-educated, adaptable individuals who have significant experience in the world beyond the classroom. Study abroad is an ideal means of developing some of the skills and attitudes, that are not only valued within the nursing profession, but also have global applicability, such as flexibility, self-reliance, and sensitivity to other cultures (Reimer-Kirkham et al 2009, Edmonds 2010).
