Highlights

- Food insecurity is a threat to subjective welfare (SWF) in developing countries
- Some urban households in developing countries lack food access
- Lack of food access correlates with higher income requirements to attain a level of SWF
- More educated households require higher income to attain a level of SWF
- Households with less social capital require higher income to attain a level of SWF
