

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#### **Abstract**

**Objective:** To explore trained volunteer doulas' and mothers' experiences of doula support at birth and their perceptions of how this related to the midwife's role.

**Design:** A qualitative descriptive study, informed by phenomenological social psychology.

**Methods:** Semi-structured interviews were carried out between June 2015 and March 2016.

Interview transcripts were analysed using inductive thematic analysis.

**Setting:** Three community volunteer doula projects run by third sector organisations in England.

Participants: 19 volunteer doulas and 16 mothers who had received doula support during labour.

**Findings:** Three overarching themes emerged: (1) 'the doula as complementary to midwives', containing subthemes 'skilled physical and emotional support', 'continuous presence', 'woman-

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
