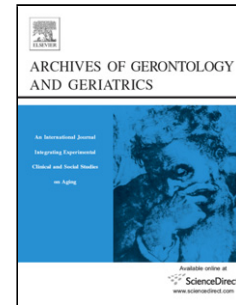


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Differing trends in fall-related fracture and non-fracture injuries in older people with and without dementia

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Highlights

- Injury is the most common reason for admission to hospital for people with dementia in Australia
- Fall-related injury hospitalisation rates remain higher for people with dementia, however
- Hip fractures rates decreased by 4.2% p.a. in people with dementia, but remained constant for people without
- Non-fracture injury rates increased for both people with and without dementia

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
