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The relations between empathy, guilt, shame and depression in inpatient adolescents

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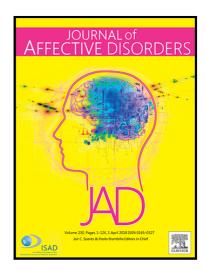
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## Highlights

- Generalized shame, contextual shame and generalized guilt mediate the relationship between affective empathy and depressive symptoms in inpatient adolescents.
- Cognitive empathy is associated the most strongly with contextual guilt and not related to depressive symptoms.
- Shame and generalized guilt associated with affective sharing should be considered as
  possible targets for therapeutic and preventive interventions for adolescents with high
  levels of depressive symptoms.

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
