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Interpersonal styles in major and chronic depression: A systematic review and meta-analysis

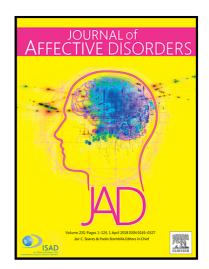
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Highlights

- Hypothesised that a hostile submissive interpersonal style distinguishes chronic depression from major depression.
- Major and chronic depression were associated with hostile and submissive interpersonal styles.
- Subgroup analyses suggest that the strength of the relationship increases with chronicity of depression.



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
