Highlights

- We examined gender-specific mental health profiles for large occupational groups
- We assessed risks of antidepressant use, sickness absence and suicide by occupation
- Distinctive mental health profiles were explained by gendered occupational status
- Class-dependent behavioural patterns related to mental health differed in men
- Gender was the most important of the examined predictors for all mental outcomes
