

Highlights

- A depression-specific risk factor contributed to later depressive disorders and symptoms in girls with a history of anxiety disorders.
- Anxious adolescent girls with blunted reward sensitivity are more likely to develop first onset depressive disorders 27 months later.
- Blunted reward sensitivity also predicted depressive symptoms 27 months later.
- Blunted reward sensitivity predicted both first onset depressive disorder and depressive symptoms only in the presence of high social anxiety symptoms.



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
